TREE SEEDLING SALE



Tree and shrub seedlings, ground cover, and various seed mixes are offered in this year's sale. These products are excellent for wildlife habitat, windbreaks, landscaping, stream buffers, ground cover, Christmas trees, and more. The sale is open to everyone and plants may be planted without restriction.

Seedlings are 1-3 years old and average 6-18 inches in height. Seedlings are bare rootstock and are dipped into a preservative gel before they are placed into a plastic bag in order to keep them moist. Each packet can be carried in one hand. Please send someone to pick up your seedlings if you are not able to come yourself. The District does not offer reimbursements for any trees that do not survive.

Order forms and payment are due to Pickaway SWCD on **Wednesday, February 20**. You may use the form included in this newsletter or the form on the District website. Tentative order distribution date is set for **Friday, April 5 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.** A postcard or email will be sent to confirm exact pick up dates, location, and times. Seedlings should be planted within 5 days after pick up and watered regularly to assure their vitality.

Deciduous Trees

Type of Tree	Mature Height	Ideal Growing Conditions
Black Cherry	60+ft	Tolerate a variety of conditions
Black Walnut	75ft	Prefers fertile, deep soils
Northern Red Oak	80+ft	Full sun and acidic soil
Sugar Maple	100+ft	Partial to full sun; well-drained soil
White Oak	100+ft	Shade tolerant, best in deep, sandy loam on south and west facing slopes

Coniferous Trees

Type of Tree	Mature Height	Ideal Growing Conditions
Bald Cypress	100-120ft	Very wet soils, muck, clay, or fine sand
Colorado Blue Spruce	100+ft	Prefers full sun, moist soil
Eastern White Pine	80ft+	Prefers full sun; shade tolerant
Norway Spruce	100ft	Grows well on most sites
Scotch Pine	50-80ft	Well-drained, dry soil and full sun

2019 Pickaway SWCD Fish Fingerling Sale



Black Crappie

2-4" fingerling- a sport fish; can grow 5-12", prefer more aquatic vegetation



Channel Catfish

4-5" fingerling- a sport and food fish; spawns are forage for bass; can grow up to 14"; easier to catch after a hard rain



Fathead Minnow

1-2" fingerling- a forage fish; can grow to 3"; readily consumed by predatory species



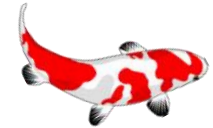
Hybrid Bluegill

2-4" fingerling- a forage and sport fish; know for their rapid growth to 10"; the primary prey of largemouth bass



Largemouth Bass

2-3" fingerling- primarily a sport fish; can grow over 25" and 14 lbs.; ravenous predatory feeder; will eat anything that fits in mouth



Japanese Koi

6-8"- Maximum length is 3 ft; do best in ponds with more than one koi; get along well with other, non-aggressive fish; great for controlling duckweed and other aquatic weeds



Redear Shellcracker

2-4"- closely related to the bluegill; popular pan fish; can grow up to 11"; eats snails, crayfish and small fish



White Amur (Grass Carp)

8-14"- good for aquatic weed control



Yellow Perch

2-3" fingerling- requires brush or weeds to lay eggs during the first part of April



Bluegill

2-4" fingerling- a forage and sport fish; can grow to 10";

Pond Conditioner

Nature's Pond Conditioner by Koenders is a two in one bottle product, containing both needed bacteria and pond dye.

Fish Sale Pick Up Information

Fish pick up will be on **April 2** from **10:30 am-11:30 am**

Location: **Pickaway Co Highway Dept Parking Lot 1660 Island Rd, Circleville**

Order forms are due by **March 29**

- Bring a 10-20 gallon garbage can or 5 gallon bucket
- Line container with non-deodorized plastic liner
- Fill half full of **your own pond water**

Approximately 10 gallons of water will hold 100 fingerlings. Each White Amur and Koi requires 2 gallons of water and must be placed in a container with a lid or a liner that can be tied at the top. All fish are guaranteed to be delivered in good condition, however, we can not guarantee survival after being picked up.

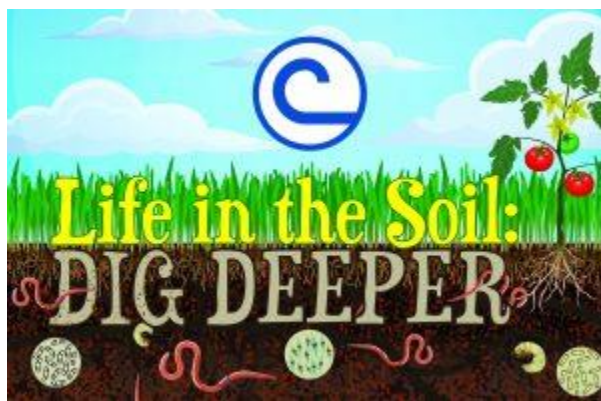

POSTER CONTEST



Calling local young artists in grades 4 through 9! It's time to break out the colored pencils and paint again for the PSWCD Soil and Water Stewardship poster contest! The contest is open to all Pickaway County students (public, private, and home schooled) who are currently in grades 4 through 9.

“**Life in the Soil: Dig Deeper**” is the 2019 theme, as selected by the National Association of Conservation Districts. The purpose of the poster contest is to provide students with an opportunity to share their thoughts about soil, water, and related natural resource issues, and to express the importance of conservation. Pickaway SWCD can provide educational materials to introduce students to the theme of soils. We can offer a short presentation on the topic to students, or you can request these materials to use on your own.

Posters will be judged in two grade level categories: **Grades 4-6** or **Grades 7-9**. Awards will be handed out in each category. First place winners will receive \$25 and second place entries will receive \$10. Both first and second place will receive medallions and their posters will be featured on placemats in restaurants around Pickaway County. Several posters from each classroom will receive honorable mention rosettes. All other participants will receive participation ribbons. First, second, and honorable mention posters will be displayed at the Pickaway County Library during Soil and Water Stewardship Week, April 28 through May 5, 2019. First place posters advance to the State Contest with a chance to advance to the National Contest. Students must complete an Entry Form (with parent signature) and tape it to the back of their poster. The Poster Contest Entry Form can be printed from the PSWCD website www.pickawayswcd.org. Posters must be to the PSWCD office by **Friday, March 1**.

DONALD E. MINOR MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The Pickaway SWCD is offering a \$500 scholarship to a Pickaway County high school senior who will be majoring in agriculture or natural resources. ENVIROTHON

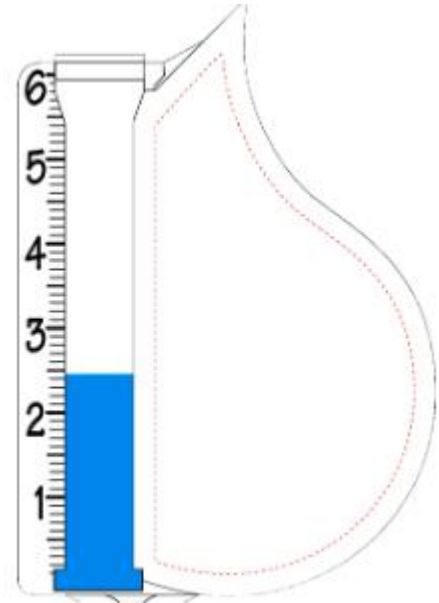
The Area 5 Envirothon will be held on **Tuesday, April 30**. This year's contest is being held at O O McIntyre Park, Gallipolis, OH 45631. Any high school teacher or home school group is allowed to form a five-student team (grades 9-12) to compete in the Envirothon. Students are tested on their knowledge of soils, forestry, wildlife, aquatic ecology, and current environmental issues. In addition, the Envirothon encourages cooperative decision making and team building. Schools are allowed to send up to three teams per school and are encouraged to think about forming a freshman team, so they gain experience in competing. What are Grassed Waterways?

Grassed waterways are channels constructed to a specific grade seeded to grass or another suitable type of vegetation that are designed to reduce the speed of water traveling through this channel to a speed which will not cause erosion. Typically, this practice is installed in areas of a field in which there has been a rigorous flow of water that has led to the formation of deep gullies if they are not fixed. These deep gullies can prove to be a hinderance when trying to cross a field with farm equipment and will get worse over time. According to Ohio State University Extension, grassed waterways are installed to carry the runoff from a field without causing erosion while also allowing any runoff that does occur to be filtered by the vegetation before exiting the field thus aiding in the protection of water quality.



How effective are grassed waterways? They have been shown to reduce the total phosphorous being discharged from a field location due to the increased infiltration of water to the soil resulting in less runoff, according to researchers Fiener & Auerswald. Soil erosion and sedimentation are also reduced because the grassed waterway is slowing the speed of the water down, thus leading to a reduction of these two factors. Grassed waterways are still passable by farm equipment, but it is important to minimize traffic on the waterway if possible.
