Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors

Election Notice and Procedures

Five county residents serve as supervisors on the Pickaway SWCD Board. Each supervisor serves a three-year term and may run for re-election at the end of their term. Current board members are: Steve Hawkins (resigned as of 6/8/2020), chair; Matt Anderson, vice chair; Barbara Martindale, secretary; Bill Black, treasurer/fiscal agent; and Clyde Ohnewehr, member. The Board of Supervisors guide the staff and partnering agencies in efforts to implement conservation programs which address management and conservation of soil, water and related resources.

Bill Black and Jonathan Lohstroh have accepted the nomination to run for the Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors. The two elected supervisors will begin their term January 1, 2021. The Pickaway SWCD Annual Supervisor Election will be held from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, August 27, 2020. Voters will have the opportunity to cast their vote in the privacy of a booth at Emmett Chapel, 318 Tarlton Road, Circleville, OH 43113. Voters do not have to attend the meeting to cast a vote. Results of the election will be announced during the evening's program.

Firms, Corporations, LLC's, trusts and non-residents that own land or occupy land in Pickaway County must provide an affidavit of their eligibility, which includes designation of a voting representative, prior to casting a ballot. Affidavit forms are available at the District office and on the District's website.

There are three (3) ways an eligible voter can cast a ballot:

- 1. **Absentee Voting -** Absentee voting is available from <u>July 15, 2020 through August 27, 2020</u>. Residents wishing to vote absentee may request a ballot application and ballot from Pickaway SWCD by any of the following:

Upon request for the absentee voting, the SWCD will provide a ballot application, election ballot, and ballot envelope to the absentee voter. Absentee ballots must be returned to the SWCD office by 3:00 p.m. on August 27, 2020.

- **2. In Person Voting at the Office -** Voting may take place at the Pickaway SWCD office from <u>August 14, 2020 through August 27, 2020</u>. Voting may take place from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on all days except August 27, when in person voting at the office will end at 3:00 p.m.
- **3.** In Person Voting at the Annual Meeting & Banquet Voting may take place at the Annual Meeting & Banquet located at Emmett Chapel, 318 Tarlton Road, Circleville, OH 43113 on <u>August 27, 2020</u> from 5:30 p.m. until 6:30 p.m.

Donald E. Minor Memorial Scholarship

The Donald E. Minor Scholarship was created by the Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors in memory of Donald E. Minor, Sr. and his 25 years of service to the board and community. Mr. Minor began as a supervisor in 1985 and served on the board until he passed in October 2010. Funds from the scholarship are currently accumulated from Affiliate Memberships and Pumpkin Show parking lot fees. The award is available to any Pickaway County High School or Home School Senior who will be majoring in Agriculture or Natural

Resources. The scholarships are for the purpose of continuing higher education

at a two- or four-year college or university.

Our fifth annual Donald E. Minor Memorial Scholarship was presented to four deserving students here in Pickaway County. Our office awarded Alexus Henry, Courtney Thomas and Caroline Winter of Teays Valley High School and Riley Minor of Westfall High School each with a \$500 scholarship.

Technical Corner

Only Rain Down the Drains and Ditches

Do you ever notice the storm drains and grassed ditches along the side of the street as you're driving? When it rains, water running off our roofs, driveways, sidewalks, and parking lots into our streets is directed into these drains and ditches and begins its journey to the nearest waterway. Often this is a direct journey, with the water running straight to a river or stream. Stormwater picks up oil, other automobile fluids, trash, fertilizer and other pollutants, and in many areas is discharged untreated into our streams. Even when this water passes through a pond or other stormwater feature, pollutants are not entirely removed and still make their way to our waterways.

We swim, wade, kayak and fish in these rivers and streams. Moreover, people rely on water from these water bodies for their drinking water. The vast majority of people in the Columbus metropolitan area, for example, drink water taken from rivers and streams. The more pollutants that go into our streams, the more money we have to spend to clean the water for drinking. Reducing pollution is everyone's job. Keeping stormwater from polluting our streams depends on all of us. Only rain should go down a storm drain or a ditch.

What can we do to help prevent water pollution?

- Sweep grass clippings and lawn care products back onto the lawn.
- Pick up trash.
- Absorb and clean up auto fluid spills, and fix leaking automobiles.
- Use drip pans to catch engine oil and other pollutants while repairing cars.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Sweep driveways clean instead of hosing them down (if you live in town).
- Don't dump waste into storm drains or ditches.
- Water your lawn by hand, or adjusted sprinklers to avoid over-watering. If any water flows off your lawn, you're using too much water.



NRCS Updates

Proper Management of CRP Grass Cover

In the past, aesthetic mowing of CRP grass cover was a widely accepted practice by many participants. Today with more research and understanding, it has been shown that properly managed grass cover will reduce soil erosion, improve water quality, and is more beneficial to wildlife than annually mowed grass covers.

Wildlife, especially grassland birds including pheasants and quail, and pollinators, such as bees and butterflies, view properly managed CRP cover as a source of food and habitat suitable to raise their young. Wildlife will not be attracted to CRP cover if plants are not allowed to mature. Game birds and bees are disappearing because of habitat loss.

Properly managed grass cover does not include noxious weeds such as thistle and teasel or woody species like trees and multiflora rose. These noxious weeds must be controlled. This can be done in several ways. Mowing of CRP cover, not to exceed 20% of the total CRP acres in a field, is permitted. This activity must be included in your conservation plan and be conducted outside of Ohio's primary nesting season (March 1st – July 15th). The location of this mowing shall be changed from year to year. Another option to control noxious weeds is by spot mowing affected areas or spot spraying of an approved herbicide. These treatments will have a minimal effect on the CRP practice cover's ability to meet the purposes of erosion control, water quality, and wildlife habitat.

Unauthorized disturbance of CRP cover is considered a violation of the terms and conditions of the CRP contract and conservation plan. Violations could potentially result in hefty penalties including contract termination and refund of all contract related payments.

Properly maintained CRP cover can be very attractive if noxious weeds and invasive species are controlled and grasses and wildflowers are allowed to mature. Please scout your CRP fields before weeds go to seed. Contact your local FSA office for permission to spot treat your CRP grass cover during Ohio's primary nesting season (March 1st – July 15th). Plan to have your CRP cover assessed for the need of mid-contract management activities that are designed to enhance your CRP cover for wildlife. Mid-contract management is a contractual obligation that is outlined in your CRP-1 Appendix and conservation plan. Contact your USDA County office for more information on proper maintenance and management of CRP practice cover. The number for Pickaway County is 740-477-1691.
