Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisor

Election Notice and Procedures

Five county residents serve as supervisors on the Pickaway SWCD Board. Each supervisor serves a three-year term and may run for re-election at the end of their term. Current board members are: Jonathan Lohstroh, chair; Matt Anderson, vice chair; Dewey Mann, secretary; Bill Black, treasurer/fiscal agent; and Brian Reid, member. The Board of Supervisors guide the staff and partnering agencies in efforts to implement conservation programs which address management and conservation of soil, water and related resources.

Matt Anderson and Andrew "Dewey" Mann have accepted nominations to run for the Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors. The two elected supervisors will begin their term January 1, 2023. The Pickaway SWCD Annual Supervisor Election will be held from August 9 through September 7, 2022. Voters will have the opportunity to vote in the office, by mail, or at our Annual Meeting and Banquet on September 7 at Flora & Field, 21748 Deer Creek Road, Mt. Sterling, OH 43143. Results of the election will be announced after the votes have been tallied, which will be on or after September 7, 2022.

There are three (3) ways an eligible voter can cast a ballot:

- 1. Mail in Voting Absentee voting is available from <u>August 9, 2022 through September 7, 2022</u>. Residents wishing to vote absentee may request a ballot application and ballot from Pickaway SWCD by any of the following:

Upon request for the absentee voting, the SWCD will provide a ballot application, election ballot, and ballot envelope to the absentee voter. Absentee ballots must be returned to the SWCD office by 3:00 p.m. on September 7, 2022.

- **2. In Person Voting at the Office -** Voting may take place at the Pickaway SWCD office from August 9, 2022 through September 7, 2022. Voting may take place from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on all days except September 7, when in person voting at the office will end at 3:00 p.m.
- **3. In Person Voting at the Annual Meeting & Banquet -** Voting will take place at the Annual Meeting & Banquet located at Flora & Field, 21748 Deer Creek Road, Mt. Sterling, OH 43143 on September 7, 2022 from 5:30 p.m. until 6:00 p.m.

Donald E. Minor Memorial Scholarships

The Donald E. Minor Scholarship was created by the Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors in memory of Donald E. Minor, Sr. and his 25 years of service to the board and community. Mr. Minor began as a supervisor in 1985 and served on the board until he passed in October 2010. Funds from the scholarship are currently accumulated from Affiliate Memberships and Pumpkin Show parking lot fees. The award is available to any Pickaway County High School or Home School Senior who will be majoring in Agriculture or Natural Resources. The scholarships are for the purpose of continuing higher education at a two- or four-year college or university.

Our seventh annual Donald E. Minor Memorial Scholarship was presented to three deserving students here in Pickaway County. Our office awarded **Kelsey Whittington** and **Julia Kitchen** of Logan Elm High School and **Adriahna Karr** of Westfall High School each with a \$1,000 scholarship.

Farm 4R Future

The 4Rs. For many of us the first thought that comes to mind is the old "School Days" tune and the golden rule of learning reading, 'riting, 'rithmetic and everyone's favorite, recess. While no doubt these things were all important to us as children, the golden rule for agriculture today is the 4Rs of nutrient stewardship: Right fertilizer source at the Right rate at the Right time and in the Right place. Properly managed fertilizers support agricultural systems that provide economic, social and environmental benefits. On the other hand, poorly managed nutrient applications can waste time and money while increasing nutrient losses, potentially degrading water and air. 4R nutrient stewardship requires the implementation of Best Management Practices (BMPs) that optimize the efficiency of fertilizer use. The goal of fertilizer BMPs is to balance amount of fertilizer added with crop requirements and to minimize nutrient losses from fields. Selection of BMPs varies by location, and those chosen for a given site are dependent on local soil and climatic conditions, crop management conditions and other site-specific factors. Other agronomic and conservation practices, such as no-till farming, cover crops, buffer strips, and crop rotation play a valuable role in supporting 4R nutrient stewardship. As a result, fertilizer BMPs are most effective when applied in conjunction with other agronomic and conservation practices. Combining these practices not only fosters nutrient stewardship, but can increase yields and improve soil health and resiliency in the long term. Proper Management of CRP Grass Cover

In the past, aesthetic mowing of CRP grass cover was a widely accepted practice by many participants. Today with more research and understanding, it has been shown that properly managed grass cover will reduce soil erosion, improve water quality, and is more beneficial to wildlife than annually mowed grass covers.

Wildlife, especially grassland birds including pheasants and quail, and pollinators, such as bees and butterflies, view properly managed CRP cover as a source of food and habitat suitable to raise their young. Wildlife will not be attracted to CRP cover if plants are not allowed to mature. Game birds and bees are disappearing because of habitat loss.

Properly managed grass cover does not include noxious weeds such as thistle and teasel or woody species like trees and multiflora rose. These noxious weeds must be controlled. This can be done in several ways. Mowing of CRP cover, not to exceed 20% of the total CRP acres in a field, is permitted. This activity must be included in your conservation plan and be conducted outside of Ohio's primary nesting season (March 1st – July 15th). The location of this mowing shall be changed from year to year. Another option to control noxious weeds is by spot mowing affected areas or spot spraying of an approved herbicide. These treatments will have a minimal effect on the CRP practice cover's ability to meet the purposes of erosion control, water quality, and wildlife habitat.

Unauthorized disturbance of CRP cover is considered a violation of the terms and conditions of the CRP contract and conservation plan. Violations could potentially result in hefty penalties including contract termination and refund of all contract related payments.

Properly maintained CRP cover can be very attractive if noxious weeds and invasive species are controlled and grasses and wildflowers are allowed to mature. Please scout your CRP fields before weeds go to seed. Contact your local FSA office for permission to spot treat your CRP grass cover during Ohio's primary nesting season (March 1st – July 15th). Plan to have your CRP cover assessed for the need of mid-contract management activities that are designed to enhance your CRP cover for wildlife. Mid-contract management is a contractual obligation that is outlined in your CRP-1 Appendix and conservation plan.
